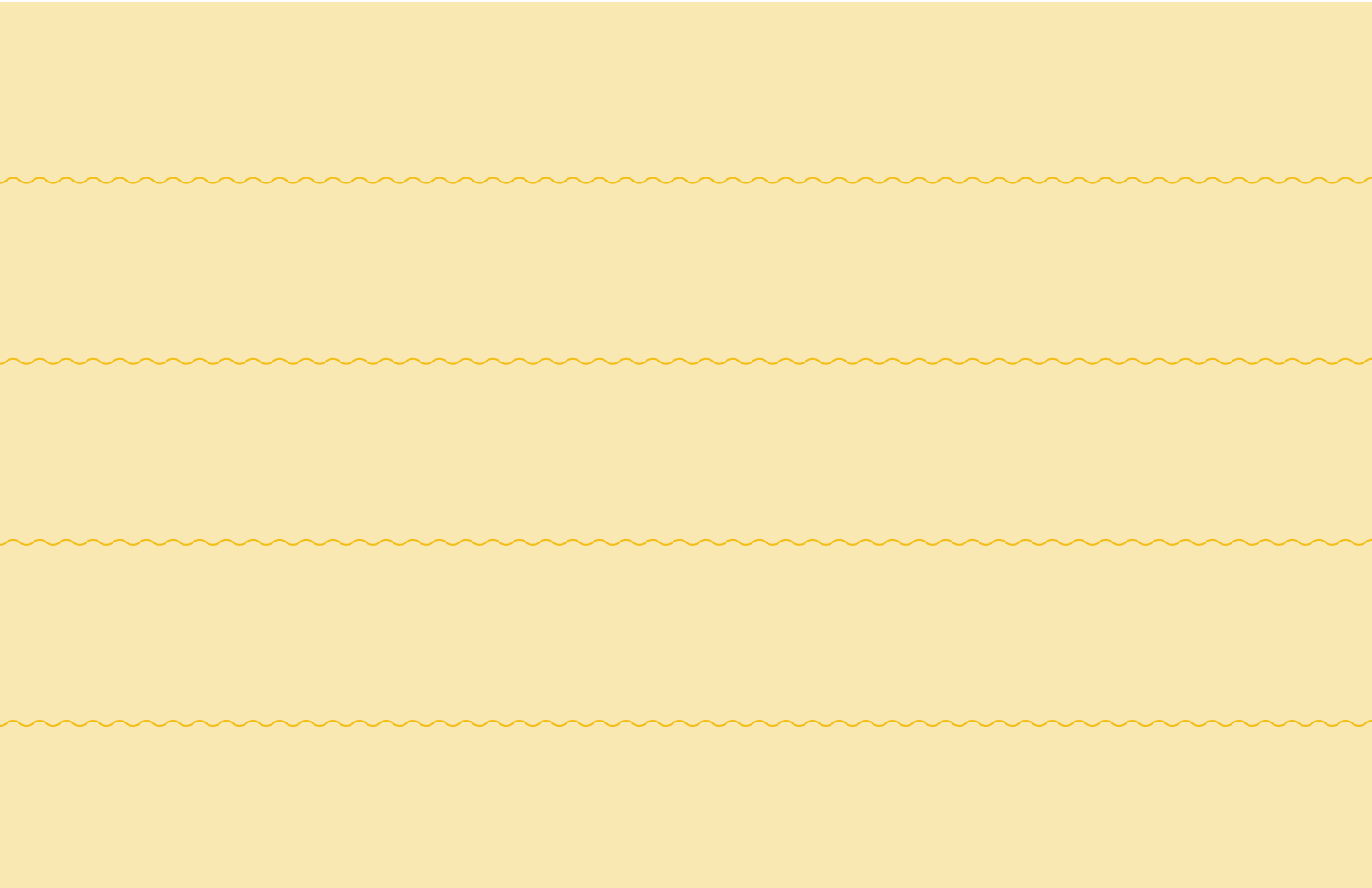


The Elementary Survival Guide
